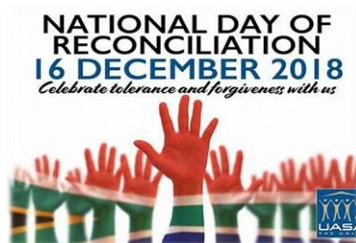
Human Rights Day

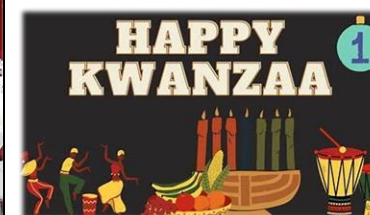
Boxing Day (UK)

New Zealand's national day commemorates the signing of the Waitangi treaty in 1840 between British settlers and the Maori peoples.

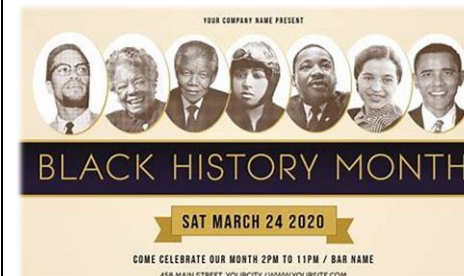



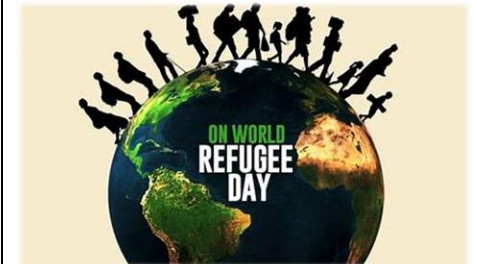
Flag Day (USA)

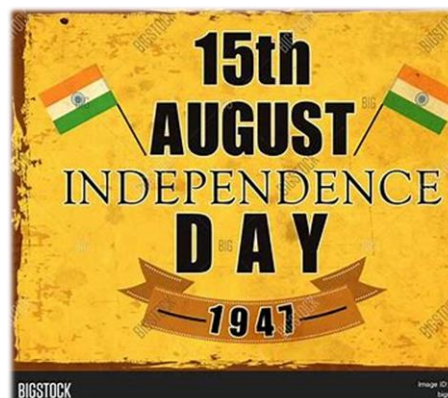

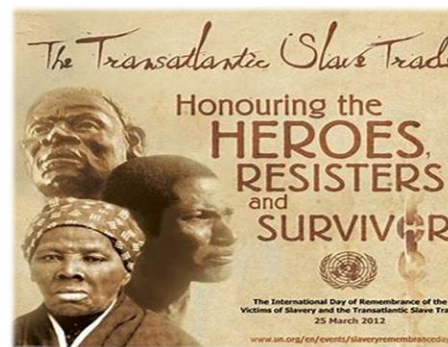
**Indian Independence
